In her day job, Ms. Brooks is the Director of the Illinois Office of the Corporation for Affordable Housing, and currently serves on the Zoning Board of Appeals for the City of Chicago. To that end. Ms. Brooks has worked with the National League of Cities to launch an initiative called the Housing Supply Accelerator (HSA). According to the press release issued by both organizations, the HSA is being built as a national advance and incentivize local campaign to approaches to land use, zoning and housing development and preservation. Ms. Brooks encouraged planners to check out the new Equity in Zoning Policy Guide. The policy guide was approved by the APA Delegate Assembly on December 15, 2022 and ratified five days later by the APA Board of Directors. Ms. Brooks contends that many communities across the country are already in the throes of an affordable housing crisis, and that planners are well qualified and positioned to bring stakeholders together to address the issue. Brooks also encouraged those in attendance to review the 2023 Trends Report for Planners. The report outlines 'existing, emerging and potential future trends.'

#### **MEMBERSHIP UPDATE**

#### PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Professional Development Committee (PDC) has been working on several goals, such as creating Citizen Planner modules, seeking APA WV representation at state and national conferences, and ways to assist members on their AICP journey. During the March meeting, it was suggested that the committee seek funding to hire a firm to develop Citizen Planner modules.

After review and in consultation with the Executive Committee, PDC submitted a grant application to the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation in June for financial assistance. If approved, grant funds would be used to develop six (on-demand) modules:

- The Role of the Citizen Planner
- The Role of the Planning Commission
- The Importance and Impact of the Comprehensive Plan
- Survey of Plan Implementation Methods
- The Role of the Board of Zoning Appeals.
- Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law

Given the Chapter's small budget and revenue stream, the Northern Brownfield Assistance Center (NBAC) in conjunction with the WVU Foundation has graciously agreed to serve as the financial sponsor for the application. PDC very much appreciates all the collaborative efforts and will be sure to keep the membership updated on this exciting opportunity.

#### **LEGISLATIVE UDPATE**

The Legislative Committee (LC) has met many times over the past few months monitoring the legislative session in particular. As the LC had been working diligently on modifications to WV 8A language to add clarity, improve logic and timelines in a few instances, and, for those jurisdictions planning with the aid of staff, add a modicum of flexibility specifically designed to take advantage of that staff's abilities. Most of those changes were passed in HB 3215 and signed into law by the Governor. A number of proposed changes were dropped as they seemed too far for the legislature to go at this time. The LC, WV DOH and others are reviewing these to fine-tune these proposals, possibly leading to a phase II bill for next year's legislative session. Working constructively with legislators and other groups is the best way to start the process of mutual education and hopefully will lead to increased work together in the future.

The LC monitored a number of other bills as well. They composed and posted positions on the WV APA website. Furthermore, a number of LC members rallied to support/promote standard APA positions in front of the legislature where proposed bills seemed to threaten those positions — in particular, efforts to suppress local voice in development and economic decisions that impact localities, viz. power generation and large-scale farms. These had substantive, but unfortunately far from sweeping, success.

In the process of offering suggested changes to the legislation, it was noted that WV APA needs to do some work in order to clarify the internal process for feedback and endorsement, which the LC has begun undertake after the legislative session finished. A timeline/process is under review and will be improved and made available to the Chapter for review.


Organizers are working with the American Planning Association and NWVBA to qualify at least once course for AICP CM credits. Stay tuned for an agenda for the chapter meeting.

#### WV FLOODPLAIN CONFERENCE UPDATE

The WV Floodplain Management Association Conference was held at Cacapon Resort State Park from May 15-17. The WV APA was happy to know that several of our members were able to attend, learn, and network with this group doing important planning work in the state. Patricia Usher, former Planner for the City of Huntington and Professional Development Chair, presented a session titled Floodplain Management which Planning and described the nexus between planning and floodplain management and highlighted the WV Chapter as a potential resource and collaborator with the WV Floodplain Managers organization.



In addition, Melissa Scott, Planner for Hardy County Local Government Executive Committee Member, was awarded WV Floodplain Manager of the Year! Jared Anderson, also in attendance stated. "Melissa has been a steadfast proponent of floodplain management and land use planning in this state for many years. She has navigated difficult situations with grace, resolve, and uncompromising values. It was also nice to see that the entire Hardy County Commission and many of the Hardy County Planning Commission came to the conference to support her."

### WV STATE RESILIENCY OFFICE UPDATE

Senate Bill 677 created potential funding mechanisms to assist communities with disaster recovery, disaster preparedness, flood resiliency, and mitigation efforts. A new Flood Resiliency Plan will be developed over the coming year to provide a map to flood resilience in the mountain state. It will replace the historic Flood Protection Plan.
